Who Was Boudicca and What Was She Like?

Boudicca was a British queen. She fought against the Romans.

Boudicca is believed to have:

- been very tall;
- had long, **auburn** hair;
- been scary to be around;
- had a fierce look in her eye;
- had a **stern** voice;
- worn a thick, colourful cloak;
- worn a large, golden necklace.



When Did She Live?

Boudicca is thought to have lived between AD 30 and AD 60.

What Is Boudicca Famous For?

Boudicca's husband was called Prasutagus. Prasutagus was the king of the Iceni people. When her husband died, Boudicca led the Iceni people in a battle against the Romans.

Did you know...?

Boudicca and Prasutagus had two daughters but nobody knows what they were called.

What Exactly Was Her Name?

There have been lots of different spellings of Boudicca's name throughout history. The first spelling was written by Tacitus, who spelt it both as Boudica and Boudicca.

It is thought that somebody who copied Tacitus's work in 1624 might have accidentally spelt her name as Boadicea. Her name has even been spelt as Buduica, Voadicia and Bunduca!

Nobody alive today knows exactly how Boudicca's name would have been said. Even if Boudicca herself could tell us, she would probably not have known how to write it down because not many people could read and write when Boudicca was alive.

Most people now agree that her name is **pronounced** as Boo-dih-cah.

Did you know...?

The name Boudicca is thought to come from the Celtic word 'boudā' which means 'victory'.



What Happened to Boudicca?

Nobody knows exactly what happened to Boudicca. Some people think that Boudicca drank poison so that she would not be caught by the Romans. Other people think that she became poorly during the battle.

Did you know...?

There is a statue of Boudicca in London near Westminster Bridge. The statue is called Boadicea and Her Daughters. The bronze statue shows Boudicca and her two daughters riding in a chariot which is being pulled by two horses. Boudicca has a spear in her right hand.

stern: Serious or strict.



Boudicca was a British queen. She fought against the Romans as they invaded Britain. **Scholars** agree that she was born into a noble family with royal blood.

Boudicca is believed to have been very tall and to have had long, **auburn** hair. Stories tell that she was frightening to be around because she had a fierce look in her eye and a harsh, stern voice. Although it is not known for certain, she is believed to have worn a thick, colourful cloak and a large, golden necklace.

Boudicca is thought to have lived between AD 30 and AD 60.

What Is Boudicca Famous For?

Boudicca's husband was Prasutagus. Prasutagus was the king and leader of the Iceni people. After the death of her husband, the Roman army broke a promise that they had made to Prasutagus so Boudicca led the Iceni people in a battle against them.

What Exactly Was Her Name?

Most of the things that we know about Boudicca today come from the works of Tacitus. Tacitus had been taught how to read and write so he wrote about the history of the Roman empire in an ancient language called Latin.

Many people were interested in what Tacitus had written and wanted a copy to read for themselves. However, copying books in ancient times was not easy. To copy a book, someone who knew how to read and write would need to copy the book word by word onto new paper. It is thought that somebody who copied Tacitus's work in 1624 might have accidentally misspelt Boudicca as Boadicea. Her name has even been spelt as Buduica, Voadiciea and Bunduca throughout the ages!

Did you know...?

Boudicca and Prasutagus had two daughters but nobody knows their names.



Nobody alive today knows exactly how Boudicca's name would have been pronounced. Even if Boudicca herself could tell us, she would likely not have known how to write it down. Who Was Boudicca and What Was She Like?

Boudicca was an ancient British queen who fought against the Romans as they invaded Britain during the first century AD. Scholars agree that she was of noble birth and, in ancient texts, she is described as having royal blood.



Boudicca is believed to have been very tall and to have had long, auburn hair. Ancient tales recount that she was intimidating to be around as she had a fierce look in her eye and a harsh, stern voice. Typically for the time, she is believed to have worn a thick, colourful cloak. Around her neck, it is rumoured that Boudicca liked to wear a large, golden necklace.

When Did She Live?

Boudicca is thought to have lived between AD 30 and AD 60.

What Is Boudicca Famous For?

Boudicca's husband was Prasutagus. Prasutagus was the king and leader of the Iceni people in the area mostly known today as Norfolk, England. After the death of her husband, the Roman army broke a promise that they had made to Prasutagus so Boudicca led the Iceni people in revolt against them.

What Exactly Was Her Name?

Most things that we know about Boudicca today come from the works of Tacitus, who was a Roman historian and writer. Having been born into a wealthy family, Tacitus was taught how to read and write and he documented the history of the Roman empire by writing about it in Latin. Many people were interested



in the works of Tacitus and wanted a copy to read for themselves. However, copying books in ancient times was not easy: it needed someone who knew how to read and write to copy out the book, writing it word by word onto new parchment. It is thought that somebody who copied Tacitus's work in 1624 might have accidentally misspelt Boudicca as Boadicea – a name that many

people have been taught since. In fact, many British navy ships throughout history have been named HMS Boadicea rather than HMS Boudicca. Her name has even been spelt as Buduica, Voadiciea and Bunduca throughout the ages!

As nobody alive today was around during the time when Latin was spoken in ancient Rome, there is nobody who knows exactly how her name would have been pronounced. Even if Boudicca herself could tell us, she would likely not have known how to write it down. However, most scholars now agree that the correct spelling is the one used by Tacitus (Boudicca) and that her name would most likely have been pronounced as:

Pupils' own responses, such as: I do not think that Boudicca was a fitting name for her because it comes from a word which means 'victory' yet Boudicca did not win the battle against the Romans.

Pupils' own responses, such as: Boudicca had long, auburn hair, an intimidating demeanour and wore typical Celtic clothing, such as a cloak.
